Book Criteria if Choosing Your Own Book

1. 150 pages (or more)
2. The Book must be age appropriate



<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Memory Book</u></p> <p>Create a photo album or scrapbook by selecting one character from the book. Begin at the beginning of the character's life and continue through the life of the book. Be sure to write a caption for each picture.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Graphic Novel</u></p> <p>Create a graphic novel of the book you read. Include ALL major parts with photographs/drawings that clearly tells the story.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Technology Presentation</u></p> <p>Create a technology based presentation using any of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Animoto ● Prezi ● Glogster ● Powtoon ● Slidrocket ● WIX
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Visual Art</u></p> <p>Illustrate your favorite scene and write a paragraph explaining it and why it is your favorite.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">-OR-</p> <p>Create a poster advertising your book! Include pictures and interesting details that would make others want to read it!</p> <p style="text-align: center;">-OR-</p> <p>Create a comic strip (6 boxes) including the important events of a chapter. Draw and color pictures and use words to go along.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Word Collage</u></p> <p>Write the title of the book in the center of a sheet of paper. Then look through magazines for words, phrases and sentences that illustrate or tell something about your book. As you look, think in terms of theme, setting, plot, as well as characters. Work to get fifty such words, phrases, or sentences so the whole sheet of paper will be covered. The visual impact of the collage should tell a potential reader a lot about the book.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Sculpture or Model</u></p> <p>Create a 3D representation of someone or something from your story. Write a brief description of who or what you created, its importance to the story, and why you chose that person or object.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Diary of a Character</u></p> <p>Choose 1 character and write 10-15 entries describing events from the characters point of view.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Music</u></p> <p>Create a playlist for one of the characters in the book. Write 5 song titles they might have on their iPod. Write a sentence or two explaining each one.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Alternate Ending</u></p> <p>Write a "new" ending to the book (limit 2 pages) or write a one-page report that will justify the "new" ending you choose.</p>



The Testing by Joelle Charbonneau


